

## Introduction

Leeds Trinity University and the Young Dads Collective North have worked in collaboration to find out more about young fathers' views on higher education (HE) and how fathers can be better supported in this process. The collaborative study was funded by Leeds Acts (2018).

This booklet is a starting point for young fathers interested in returning to education and who may not have the right qualifications or have questions about the process.

## What is HE and where do you study

You can study at universities, colleges and specialist institutions. HE can include:

Vocational courses provide jobfocused training for specific roles or careers (e.g. nursing, medicine, dentistry). Academic courses focus on developing deep knowledge of specific subjects, skills in independent learning and research. It also leads to other transferable skills such as intellectual, communication and organisational skills.

- There are over 40 different subjects for Higher Apprenticeships, representing hundreds of job roles and you get paid at the same time as studying.
- Higher Apprenticeships offers an alternative route to highly-skilled roles in exciting organisations and sectors.
- Higher Apprenticeships lead to a nationally recognised qualification, equivalent to the first stages of higher education. Find out more by visiting www.gov.uk or www.ucas.com.
- Degree apprenticeships are a new type of programme offered by some universities. You are employed full-time (giving you job experience) whilst studying for a Bachelor's or Master's degree at a partner university. The fees from degree apprenticeships are subsidised by employers and the government— which can leave you debt-free.
- If you apply for a traditional Student Finance loan, you will be eligible for the full tuition fees. The amount of maintenance loan is dependent on household income, however everyone is entitled to £4,054, as a minimum.
- You only begin to repay your loan when you are earning over £25,000 a year. You will repay a fixed rate of 9% of everything over this amount. After 30 years, anything you still owe will be wiped.
- Student loans are not marked on your credit file and they cannot prevent you from getting a mortgage.

- Higher Education courses offer part and full time study options.
- There are distance and online learning opportunities available.
- Some courses can be as short as one year (Access to HE routes).
- There are many courses on your doorstep!
- Many universities recognise and accept mature students, including those who have attained an 'Access to HE Diploma' and welcome such applications.
- Many universities offer additional support for mature students, those with caring responsibilities, and those who have been out of education for a while.
- Some universities offer socials for you to meet other students like yourself.



- Access to Higher Education courses provide an alternative route for adults aged 19+ who would like to go on to study in higher education, but left school without any formal qualifications.
- If you're aged 19-23, then you may not have to pay fees for an Access to HE Diploma.
- If you are 24+, you may be able to get help with the cost of your Access to HE course fees through a 19+ Advanced Learner Loan. You won't pay anything back until your income is over £25000 per year.
